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## **COLORFUL BULBS IN CONTAINERS**

For near-continuous blossoms indoors and out, plant some of your bulbs in containers! By planting a variety of bulbs, and staggering the planting of some varieties, you can have flowers over a span of many months. Here are just a few of the many possible combinations and uses.



Plant decorative containers with earlyblooming purple ar yellow crocus, and

use them to herald the end of winter as well as greet guests at your front door. A shallow ceramic container with crocus, hyacinths, or unusual daffodils makes a perfect table centerpiece and shows off these unique flowers.

Enhance a group of potted pink azaleas by adding grape hyacinths (muscari) and white crocus to their containers. Place the contain-

Maytag Jet Clean II dishwasher has three fully adjustable racks for more flexible loading options. This model also accepts interchangeable colored metal front panels or "wood panels to coordinate with your cabinetry.

Both Maytag and Whirlpool dishwashers have a garbage disposal within the unit which eliminates the need to rinse the dishes before you turn on the dishwasher. This clever feature also prevents the garbage disposal from clogging and spewing garbage water out of the release valve onto the countertop.

One of the ways the new dishwashers conserve energy is that they have internal heating elements which take the cold water and heat it for the desired temperature need just to wash the dishes. With this heater element the Whirlpool dishwasher can also warm fourteen place settings, a terrific plus for people who entertain large dinner parties. With adjustable rack heights (up to three levels) and adjustable tines you can clean big soup pots and bowls in the same load with plates.

If you are concerned about minimizing water usage, investigate models from Miele which will wash 14 place settings with only 3.7 gallons of water per wash (versus 7 gallons for the Whirlpool dishwasher). KitchenAid and Miele dishwashers are the quietest ones on the market with a rating of only 47 decibels.

While these newer dishwashers will cost \$500 to \$1000, the utility savings with these more energy efficient models make them an excellent investment in your kitchen.

ers near a garden focal point or under a deciduous tree. Freesias and paperwhite narcissus provide intense fragrance. Plant them together in pots, then set the pots on plant stands or shelves at "sniffing height" to perfume the air indoors or on a patio.

Try layering bulbs for a long lasting display. For example, plant long-blooming grape hyacinths in the same container with early season daffodils and late-blooming tulips. The hyacinths will flower continuously for several weeks. As the daffodils begin to fade, cut off the spent flowers, but not the foliage. The tulips will begin to bloom as the daffodil flowers start to decline.

This means that all nuts can be a threat to a child with a peanut allergy.

While researchers are developing some exciting new treatments for food allergies, none are yet widely available or practical. If you suspect your child is having allergic reactions to foods, seek advice from your pediatrician regarding testing and treatment.

While most peanut allergies tend to continue into adulthood, there are many ways you can help your child stay healthy, avoid coming into contact with the allergen, and be prepared for the cases when exposure cannot be avoided.

When regular phone service was inaugurated in New Haven, CT, in 1878, people said "Ahoy" instead of "Hello". New Haven is located on the busy Long Island Sound which accounts for the nautical greeting.

That isn't all that has changed. For as long as telephones had dials, the number "1" wasn't on them. the reason was electronic. Each time a caller turned the dial, it clicked (you can stillhear that on pulse-tone settings). Any number of glitches could have sent a one-click signal over the wires, which the phone would have misinterpreted as a "1." Thus dials started with a "2". Today, of course, "1" doesn't present a problem.

And here's a bit of phone trivia you may not have known. Though Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone in 1876, it's a little-known fact that his assistant Watson–who was the recipient of the first phone message, "Mr. Watson, come here, I want you"–was in fact the inventor of the telephone booth.

One incident did not cause the other, but as it happens, down the road a bit in Ballyhooly, Cork, the way the villagers used to fight, yell and call attention to themselves gave birth to the word "ballyhoo." *(Exerpted from Global Digests)*
