

WHAT ABOUT 31 YEARS AGO IN REDWOOD SHORES

Looking to the New Year I expect we will see quite a few changes in the Redwood Shores area before January 1st rolls around again. Mobil Oil Estates' limited option with the Bank of America and the Bank of Tokyo has been extended until the 31st of January, in order that Mobil may complete certain arrangements they consider necessary to ensure success of the project. The development of the Regional Shopping Center on the Redwood Peninsula, an important key to the financial well-being of the District, has come under some fire lately. It has been publicly-suggested that the proposed Shopping Center conflicts with San Carlos Airport. I find this statement is non-supportive—the location of the Shopping Center was prepared by Mobil after consultation' with the County and will provide adequate safeguards for the airport and still ensure good access for the proposed Shopping Center I anticipate that final commitment by Mobil will be made by the last week of January. 'Independent of the action Mobil takes, the City has recently undertaken financial review of the Redwood Shores Project. The Status Report and Evaluation Guidelines Operation-Structure of the Redwood Shores Project from 1966-1972 prepared by the firm of William Kuebelbeck and Associates has been delivered to the City Council and referred to staff for review. The 94-page document recounts and analyzes the history of the Redwood Shores Project, its financing and recommends criteria by which the City might judge new development of the project. In addition, specific recommendations with respect to collecting the outstanding debt We the District from Leslie Properties were presented as well as an analysis of the project on a cost-benefit basis. The City Council has approved the expenditure of funds for the next phase of the study: 1) a review and analysis of the Land for People proposal (low-moderate income housing for Shores); 2) review and analysis of Mobil Estates proposal for development of Redwood Shores and 3) review and analysis of Mobil Estates Shopping Center Proposal; sixty days will be required to complete this phase of the study.

The installation of the Belpipe for improved circulation of the waterway system has received final approval from the Army Corp of Engineers; specification and plans for the project plus request for transfer of funds will be coming before the City Council this month.

I have received several inquiries as to how revenue sharing monies can be spent by the City. The funds received by local governments may be used only for priority expenditures:

1 public safety (including law enforcement, fire protection and building code enforcement), 2 environmental protection (including sewage disposal, sanitation, and pollution abatement

3 public transportation (including transit system) and streets and road, 4 health, 5 recreation, 6 libraries, 7 social services for the poor or aged, 8 financial administration, and 9 ordinary and necessary capital expenditures authorized by law. On December 8, 1972, Redwood City received \$225,819 payment for six

months-January through June 1972.



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



WORK BEGINS ON UNDERGROUND GARAGE IN RWC

NEW WEBCAM PROVIDES ONLINE VIEW OF WORK

Excavation and other construction work for the downtown underground two-level public parking garage is scheduled to begin on Wednesday, December 17, a construction milestone event in what will ultimately become the new retail-The Redwood City Redevelopment cinema project. Agency, jointly with developer BHV Innisfree Ventures I, LLC, are planning a major retail-cinema complex above the parking garage that will greatly contribute to the renaissance of downtown Redwood City.

The excavation starting tomorrow consists of digging approximately 30 feet deep and removing an estimated 90,000 cubic yards of earth-enough dirt to cover the football field at Sequoia High School to a depth of 45 feet! The "dewatering" process involves installing 32 wells around the site and pumping down the ground water to allow for excavation. The site must also be "shored," a procedure entailing driving steel beams approximately 45 feet deep spaced every eight feet, and installing wood between the steel beams.

This work is expected to last until the beginning of March depending on weather, and the excavation will consist of hauling out at least 120 truckloads of dirt per day. The dirt will be hauled to the end of Seaport Boulevard where it will be used

help firm and settle existing soil at the site of a proposed marina development.

The City will have inspectors on site to help minimize traffic disruption and assure a smooth flow of trucks. The contractors on the project are required to take all reasonable measures to minimize dirt on the roadways, including watering and sweeping. It's expected that the trucks will travel from the site up Middlefield Road, then east on Woodside Road to Seaport Boulevard. Pedestrians, bicyclist and motorists are urged to use caution around the construction site during this activity.

Anyone with Internet access can view the ongoing work via the City's new construction project webcam, by visiting www.redwoodcity.org/webcam. This webcam will remain active for the duration of the entire project, from the garage excavation through completion of the retail-cinema project.
