My client Tonya was dismayed that her one-year-old Bichon was evacuating bowels and bladder all over her lovely Emerald Hills home. The final straw came after a trip to her parents' house in the South East. Prudence celebrated an accident-free week in Dixie by resuming random deposits within hours of returning to her own home.

A second client, Bryce, claimed his three-year-old Beagle was crazy. After eight accident free months, Puddles lifted his leg against the kitchen counter, right in front of Bryce.

Farfel, a three-year-old Golden, baffled Brianna and Joe, his foster "parents" when, notwithstanding his status as "housebroken", he went on a potty spree all over their previously tastefully decorated townhouse. Farfel indulged this unwanted generosity after two accident-free days in his new surroundings.

What did Prudence, Puddles and Farfel share in common other than frustrated owners? Quite simply: confusion about leadership. Survival instinct drives any dog perceiving indifferent or inconsistent leadership on the part of an owner to self-promote - this mechanism is essential for pack survival. A pack leader goes where she or he pleases. Dogs lack both the memory and the introspection to view as high risk engaging today in behavior which they knew displeased the leader they responded to yesterday.



In Farfel's case, Brianna and Joe, new to fostering, were empathetic and solicitous - concerned by an abrupt change in Gus' living arrangements. They coddled Farfel and lavished affection at any cue he provided seeking their attention. Farfel misread empathy for submission and his perceived need to lead his new pack added to the stress he already felt. Bryce had been more subtle in contributing to Puddles confusion - turning Puddles around was a matter of recognizing the ways in which he had shown his dominance to Puddles and re-establishing dominance with a more conscious effort. Tonya recognized contrast between her soft approach to Prudence and her father's very firm manner with humans and animals alike.

In all three situations, the key was not delivering less love, attention or affection. The key lay in each human setting the agenda rather than permitting the dog to set one for the human.

TRAVELING WITH CHILDREN By Natalie Lynch, M.D.

SAFETY AND SANITY TIPS

Two-year-old Sarah didn't want to get on the plane. Right after takeoff, she began fussing, but that was nothing compared to the screaming that followed when the plane reached altitude. Sarah's ears hurt. She didn't like being cooped up, and she wouldn't stay in her seat. She was bored and eventually began kicking the seat in front of her



for entertainment, earning her parents more than a few dirty looks from the passengers in that row.

Sound familiar? Many parents have at least one nightmare story to tell about traveling on a plane with their children. This experience can be challenging and stressful. However, planning ahead can alleviate some of the stress and make for a much smoother journey.

• Arrive early at the airport to give yourself extra time to get through security.

• Let older children know that their bags, personal items and toys will have to go through the X-ray machine, but that they will not be harmed and will be returned to them on the other side of the security check. Have your children wear shoes with that slide off easily, such as those with Velcro.

• Take advantage of pre-boarding. A few airlines no longer allow pre-boarding with children. In that case, have one adult board with the carry-on items and the other adult wait until final boarding to board with the children.

• If you're traveling with an infant or toddler, you'll need to remove the child from the carrier, stroller or infant seat before boarding the plane. Most airlines will allow you to keep the stroller until the gate, where it will be checked in and made available to you at the destination gate. It is best to keep young children in their strollers even if they are able to walk to minimize risk of injury and so you can more easily handle your carry-on luggage.

• Only carry-on necessary items so you don't have your hands too full trying to juggle bags and your children.

• Pack a bag with toys and snacks to occupy your children during the flight. For toddlers, buy inexpensive new toys for long flights, wrap them with wrapping paper or even newspaper, and let them open them on the plane. It's best to bring toys that are not noisy.

• The FAA allows children under age 2 to sit on an adult's lap; however, the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that families purchase a seat for children of all ages due to safety issues. A child is best protected when restrained in a car seat until he or she weighs more than 40 lbs. and can use the aircraft seatbelt. Belt-positioning booster seats can't be used on airplanes, but they can be checked as luggage so you have them for use in rental cars and taxis.

• To decrease ear pain during takeoff and landing, encourage your infant to nurse or suck on a bottle. Toddlers can snack on something, such as raisins, that will keep them chewing and swallowing. Children ages 4 or older can try chewing gum. Avoid air travel within two weeks of when a child has an ear infection or ear surgery.



Gardening Tips From Carlmont Nursery

You can have a beautiful garden and pet pooch too. You just have to find the middle ground. Here are some pointers when installing or improving a landscape. Dogs like to guard their territory by walking around the perimeter, but they don't like solid fences or hedges. A picket fence they can see through allows them to fulfill their innate lookout and guard duty functions. You can also help confine a pet with plantings. Vary the height of the barrier, depending on the size of the animal. If your dog is a digger, provide an area of very sandy soil in an out-of-the-way corner of your garden when he/she can dig all day. A shady area is essential, especially for dogs that spend all day out doors. Walkway should be paved or made of brick, flagstone etc. They also help to keep your dog cooler and cleaner. If you want your dog out of a certain area, cover it with sharp crushed stones.





quality school sites. However, our months of deliberation established that all potential sites other than Area H had serious problems that could not be satisfactorily mitigated - we could not recommend such flawed alternatives.

For example, renovating Sandpiper Elementary would require shoe-horning 900 students into an already too-small campus that has recently been overwhelmed with 500 students. Such renovations would also require the erection of a two-story school building and would produce a much greater imposition on the surrounding neighborhoods, which are already burdened by the current Sandpiper drop-off traffic and parking.

Renovation would also create a "monster school" in a school district where the average school size is near 300 kids. This would be a great disservice to our children, teachers and community. We were concerned that with the added noise, movement, and distractions, the educational soundness of such a mega-school would certainly be in question.

Another option with which we struggled was the idea of putting the school in one of our existing parks. Our personal respect for our parks, extremely strong and unified community opposition to losing a park, the fact that Redwood City actually is looking to add park space, and other logistical issues, such as the traffic nightmares that would clog the small streets near Marlin and Mariner parks, all weighed against our recommending a park site.

Background on the New School and Measure C.

For anyone new to the Shores, the passage of Measure C last November authorized the BRSSD to issue Proposition 39 bonds to build a new elementary school in the Shores to meet the projected and overwhelming growth of school age children here.

In February 2006, in response to vigorous community demands, the School Board of the BRSSD appointed the New Shores School Advisory Committee to study and provide recommendations to the school board on various issues related to the new school. The 10 committee members are all from the Shores and were selected by two members of the School Board, the President of the Sandpiper PTA, and the President of the Redwood Shores Community Association.

The school board's initial charge to the Advisory Committee was to recommend a site for the new school. Among the 50-plus locations evaluated by the committee were small sites of as few as 2.5 acres, locations that were largely under water, poorly accessible locations, and sites with known un-mitigat-able and prohibitive hazards.

In conducting our evaluations we personally visited each site, consulted with California school site selection experts,

individually scored the sites using official state criteria, and considered the extensive community input and comments offered at Advisory Committee meetings, which were - and continue to be - conducted in public.

Please feel free to join us at any of our upcoming meetings, the dates of which will be posted on the district web site at http://www.belmont.k12.ca.us/main/district/nssac/index.html. Now that we have made our site recommendation we will begin to focus on architect selection and school design issues.

A detailed report of the Advisory Committee's evaluation process and recommendations will be issued in the near future, and we are urging the School Board to proceed with the Area H site as expeditiously as possible. It is time for the Shores to have the school it needs and deserves.



HOW TO GET YOUR ENVELOPE OPEN

The envelope is arguably the most important part of your mailing. If it doesn't get opened, your well-crafted letter and slick brochure will not see the light of day. Create tension. Don't try to close. For most envelopes, you should create an incomplete feeling or a curiosity that leads to opening the envelope. Inside, you'll have more time and space to present your offer, tell your story and close the sale. Don't make your envelopes too pretty. An envelope is like a kamikaze pilot. To catch the attention of people who have seen your package before but haven't ordered, consider changing the color of your envelope. This could be the cheapest, easiest way to boost response quickly. Show off a killer brochure with a clear envelope. Sometimes the best envelope is an invisible one if your brochure is impressive. It's tougher for your prospects to throw away your package if they can see all the colorful, valuable items inside. Clear envelopes tempt. Change the size of your envelope. Using a #10? Try a 9 by 12 inch or a 6 by 9. Make your package big and flat or small and bulky. Try an odd size. Sometimes this is all it takes to stand out in a crowded mailbox. *Submitted by Steve Elder, Accurate Mailings, Inc*
